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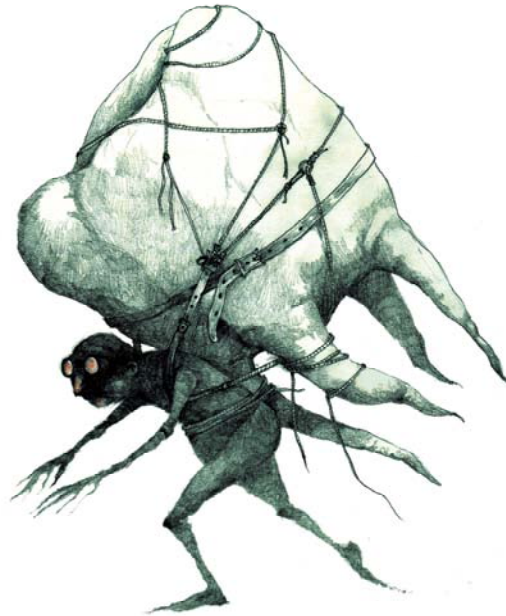

It is time for the truth to be told. Witness this tale of Abigail, the Girl With Perfect Teeth. Cheer her crusade to save the world from the Tooth Fairy, and thereby preserve for eternity the innocent happiness of childhood. No more shall our golden days be bought from us!

The Old Trout Puppet Workshop adapted (and helped write) the cult classic children's book **The Tooth Fairy**, the first book in the Governor-General's Award short-listed series **Preposterous Fables for Unusual Children**, written and illustrated by Judd Palmer.

The result is a colossus of the puppet stage. The Old Trouts do not shirk from extravaganza. Monsters! Cosmic curses! Sea-battles! Broadway brou-ha-ha! Heart-wrenching laments! 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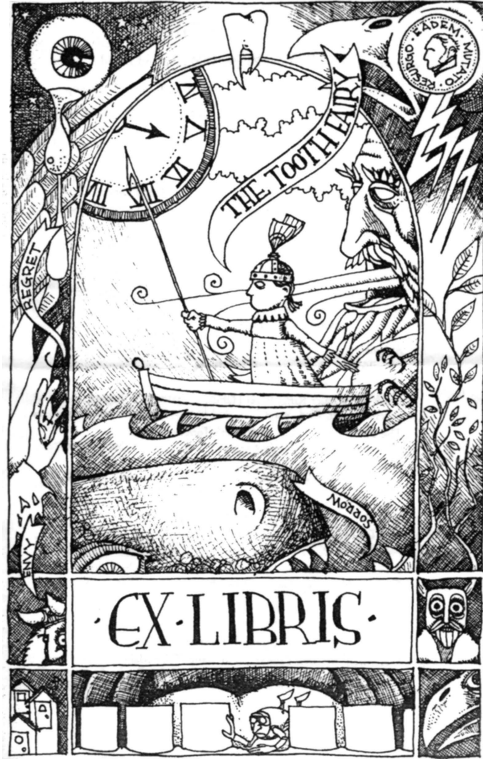

## SYNOPSIS

What hidden poetry lurks in children's stories? Viewed from a certain angle, *The Wizard of Oz* could spring from the mind of Kafka; squinting just so, *Where the Wild Things Are* becomes Freudian allegory; and *Alice in Wonderland* is a proto-surrealistic fancy. Yet the tradition of the Tooth Fairy is something we take for granted: what dark truths are hidden in the exchange of baby teeth for money?

*The Tooth Fairy* attempts to illuminate this murky territory. On stage is a ramshackle fantasy machine, constructed out of wood and stained glass and copper, hung with waiting puppets, their eyes staring. Skittering about in the shadows we glimpse the Trout puppeteers, who have come to deliver a grim parable of innocence lost, and sacrifices made; treacheries inflicted and tears wept; the ultimate and inevitable victory of time over us, and of love over time. It all begins with a face looming from the gloom: "There once was a girl named Abigail, who had perfect teeth."



And so we learn that Abigail lives in a world ruled by her Grandfather, who has no teeth at all. Spurred by a secret from his youth, Grandfather is plagued by madness: he stands guard against the Tooth Fairy, who he believes would steal his grand-daughter's smile. But Abigail is impetuous in her innocence, and one day is given an apple by a strange man in the forest. Woe to the world! Abigail's beautiful tooth is loose.

On that night the Tooth Fairy scrapes at her window: "is it out, dear child? Is your tooth... out?" Grandfather chases it away, but Abigail is tired of living in fear. She steals away in the night, clad in the suit of armour from the hall, wielding her Grandfather's old harpoon, and sails in search of the Tooth Fairy's castle. She will rid the world of the Tooth Fairy menace, and be a hero to all for all time.

Of course the world is a treacherous place, and her journey will be long and dangerous. She endures many dangers: pirates who steal teeth for the Tooth Fairy's reward; a Sea Monster whose mother told him that he has the most beautiful teeth in the world; a maroon in the ice who wishes he had no teeth at all.

By the time she reaches the Tooth Fairy's Castle to discover the mortal truths within its walls her Grandfather lies dead in the dark forest, her tooth is gone, and redemption seems beyond grasp. And the final question is answered:

What does the Tooth Fairy do with all those teeth?

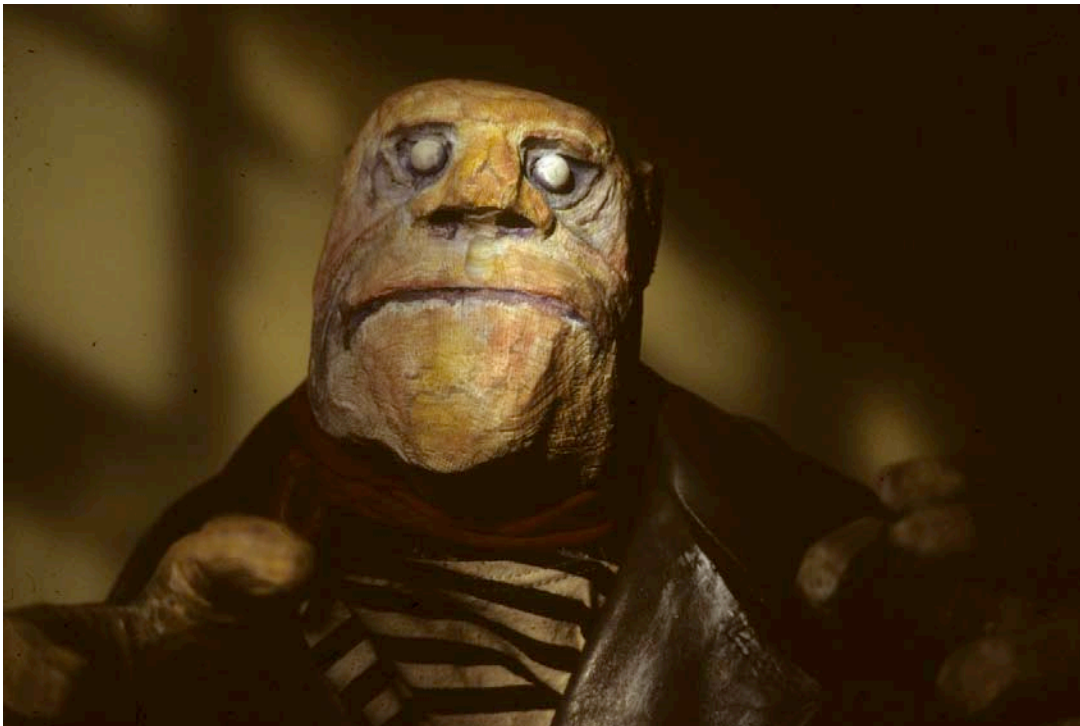
